Dissertation: "Writing Maya Women: Representations of Gender in Contemporary Yucatec Maya Literatures" This dissertation argues that Yucatec Maya women's writing since 1980 revises oral tradition in order to incorporate women more fully into Maya decolonial projects. Examining works by Briceida Cuevas Cob, Ana Patricia Martínez Huchim, and Sol Ceh Moo, among others, it demonstrates how these texts assert female authority by reimagining oral genres associated with power. As women's perspectives gain recognition, they transform the narrative repertoire through which Yucatec Maya people articulate a shared Indigenous identity.
